To our Christopher House community,

I continue to be inspired by the unwavering resilience and unique fortitude of our Christopher House scholars, teachers, staff, and families. Despite the many challenges we faced as we navigated through the pandemic, our community has emerged with compassion, equity, and a renewed commitment to excellence at the forefront of our minds.

I am in awe of our community's ability to adapt over the past year, as we allowed best-practices, carefully collected data, and diverse voices to guide us in our response to COVID-19 and in our return to in-person learning. Through our family of schools, we continue to meet the needs of our community members, delivering personalized, high-quality education with immersive family support to children and their caregivers.

The success of our team's creative and thoughtful response to the challenges we faced as a family cannot go unnoticed, with 53% of preschoolers transitioning into kindergarten being "kindergarten ready," which is a year-over-year 18 percentage point increase in kindergarten readiness, 100% of our 8th graders matriculating to high school, and 1,635 individuals receiving food and household supplies from our three on-site pantries.

I cannot emphasize enough that the ongoing development and growth of our team, the continuous achievements of our scholars, and the personalized advocacy provided to families would not be possible without the generous support of our community members and donors. From my heart to yours – thank you.

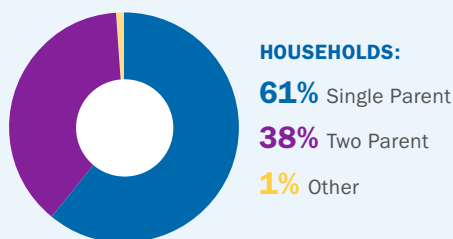
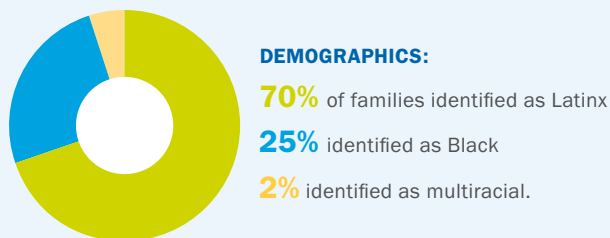

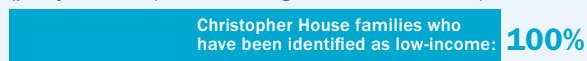


AVERAGE HOUSEHOLD INCOME:

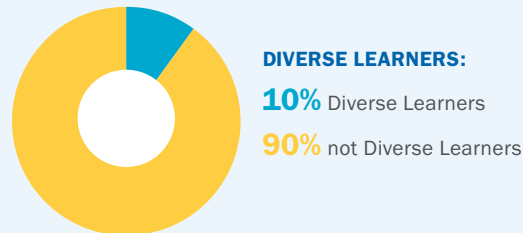
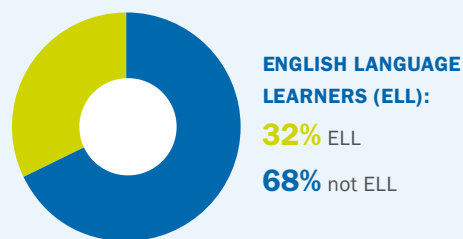
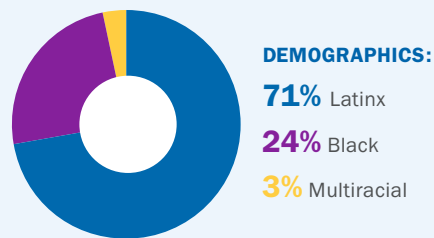


LOW-INCOME:

Our History, Mission, and Vision

Since its founding in 1906, Christopher House has created opportunity and advanced equity by delivering high-quality, innovative programming that serves the needs of our community. From being one of the first Head Start providers in the 1960s to launching the Christopher House Elementary School in 2013, Christopher House has honed a continuum of education model with immersive family support that enables scholars and their caregivers to thrive.

Today, we deliver this model to thousands of scholars, starting at birth through the 8th grade, across our family of schools located in Belmont Cragin, Logan Square, and Uptown. We build strong, trusting relationships with families – scholars and their caregivers – to provide coordinated support and care to create pathways to success for the whole family.

Our Family of Schools

Infant & Pre-School annually prepares over 300 children for kindergarten, beginning at 6 weeks old. All of our preschools are accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) – a distinction awarded to only 10% of early learning schools across the country – and each school has received Gold Circle of Quality, the highest ranking from ExceleRate Illinois. In 2022, 80% of our preschool children showed social-emotional learning development level expected of children transitioning to kindergarten.

Elementary & Middle School provides more than 460 scholars in grades K-8 with a personalized education, including a STEAM curriculum, ongoing professional development of our qualified staff, and a college going culture that ensures every scholar is prepared for the future. In June 2022, we celebrated another completion of our birth through 8th grade model with Christopher House's second graduating class of 8th graders. 100% of our scholars matriculated to high school and 92% of scholars were accepted to their top five best-fit high schools, including CPS Selective Enrollment Schools.

After School works with more than 200 students, ages six to fourteen, to explore new opportunities, achieve academic excellence, and develop healthy behaviors and soft skills needed for success in school, home, college, and the workplace. Last year, 89% of all after school students improved their grades from first semester to second semester or maintained a B average.

Parent School supports families by providing the resources and knowledge needed to promote stable, healthy home environments that advance each child's academic, social, and emotional development. Resources include Family Advocates, counseling, parent education, home-visiting services, on-site food pantries, and emergency financial assistance. Christopher House distributed emergency rental assistance to over 500 families during the pandemic, and 1,635 (unduplicated) individuals received food from our on-site food pantries throughout 2022.

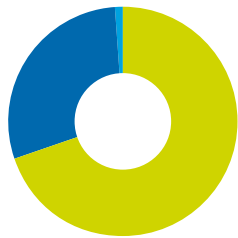

Early Head Start Scholar and Family Demographic Information

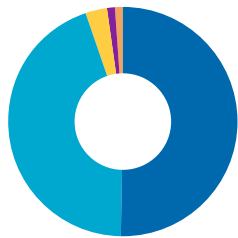


EHS FAMILY STRUCTURE

Christopher House Early Childhood Education

Christopher House operates three Infant & Pre-Schools located in Belmont Cragin, Logan Square, and Uptown, including Early Head Start (EHS) programs. All our Infant & Pre-Schools are National Association for Education of Young Children (NAEYC) accredited and have received the Gold Circle of Quality, the highest possible ranking, by ExceleRate Illinois.

In Fiscal Year 2022 (FY22), EHS supported 381 scholars and 312 EHS families across our three schools located in Belmont Cragin, Logan Square, and Uptown. 100% of eligible children were served in EHS, and the average monthly enrollment rate was 92.43%, a six percentage-point increase from FY21.

The communities we served in FY22 were primarily low-income communities on the North and Northwest sides of Chicago, and the average monthly income for EHS families was \$11,843, and 70% of our scholars come from single-parent homes. Our EHS scholars receive 376 hours of both individual and group counseling during the 2022 Fiscal Year.

In FY22, 80% of our Preschool children showed social-emotional learning development levels expected of children transitioning to kindergarten. Moreover, 53% of preschoolers transitioning into kindergarten testing kindergarten ready, which is a year-over-year 18 percentage-point increase in kindergarten readiness. Of EHS students: 95% of infant and

toddlers met their growth target in social-emotional development, 93% in math, 80% in literacy, 87% in cognitive, and 92% in language based on the Teaching Strategies GOLD assessment.

Christopher House's Parent School provides a Family Advocate for every scholar enrolled in our programs and connects caregivers to immersive family support delivered by Christopher House or partner agencies. Parent School delivers parent workshops, counseling and mental health supports, on-site food pantry, and emergency financial assistance.

Christopher House continues to work in partnership with caregivers through the Parent Policy Council, which is imperative to our dual governance. Parent Policy Council meetings give parents a chance to advocate for their children, and a representative is in attendance at all Board of Directors meetings to share their perspective.

Community Needs Assessment

Each year, The Family and Community Engagement team complete its Community Assessment to understand the needs and resources of Christopher House's three key communities (Logan Square, Belmont Cragin and Uptown) to better serve our families through effective program planning. The Leadership Team is tasked with reviewing the Community Assessment to ensure we best understand how to serve our Christopher House families, and this includes assessing the needs of each community and carefully analyzing our constituents' access to other early childhood programs in each community.

A variety of Christopher House staff, and community partners were included in the development of the most recent Community Assessment. The data was gathered through studies conducted by local social service agencies, the US Census Bureau 2016-2020 American Community Survey 5 Year Estimates, the Research Department at Illinois Action for Children, research presented by the Chapin Hall at the University of Chicago in contract with the Department of Family and Support Services, Christopher House family assessment results, parent focus groups, and visits to local businesses and agencies in the communities of Belmont Cragin, Logan Square, and Uptown.

Christopher House's Fiscal Year 2022 Community Assessment additionally sourced information from the U.S. Census Bureau's 2016-2020 American Community Survey, the Illinois Action for Children's "Population and Poverty Data by Chicago Community Area" (December 2020), the Illinois Action for Children's "Key Indicators of need for Chicago Communities Profiles of the 77 Chicago Community Areas" (Spring 2019), Chapin Hall's "Early Childhood Care Programs Supply and Demand" (2020), and the Illinois Action for Children's "Licensed Child Care for Young Children in Chicago by Community Area" (2020).

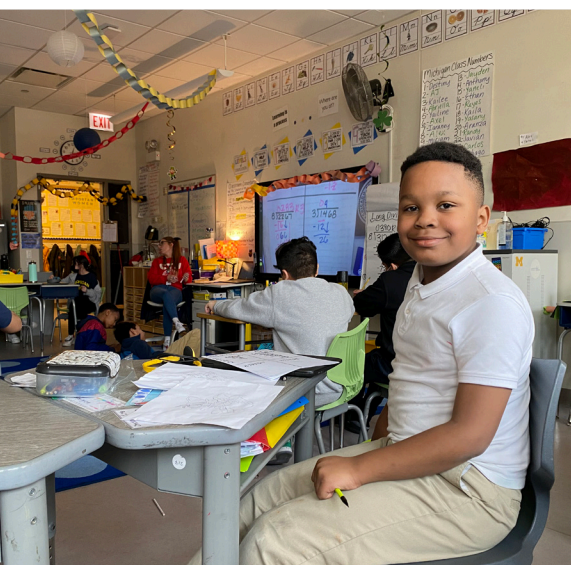
